MODULE 1: LISTEN TO SURVIVORS

Discussion Questions:

1. How can someone protect themselves in a situation where they thought they were comfortable and safe?
2. What are examples of victim blaming?
3. How do we make a survivor more comfortable with speaking up?
4. How should someone treat a survivor like Jessica after she tells her story?
5. Why is it important to teach and expose these types of situations and consent at a younger age?

MODULE 2: KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Discussion Questions:

1. Why is consent important?
2. What are things that could alter our ability to give consent?
3. Are women the only ones who can give consent?
4. What are signs that someone is NOT giving consent?
5. Why is it important to know these signs?

MODULE 3: TRUST YOUR INSTINCTS

Discussion Questions:

1. Why shouldn't we always trust our instincts?
2. What are preventative strategies that can minimize community sexual assault?
3. Why is sexual assault not an "individual problem," but more so a community problem?
4. What can the hard conversations look like about someone's behavior and why it is wrong?
5. What are examples of how we can change the campus culture?
6. Should we teach people how not to get raped, or how not to rape?

Discussion Questions:

1. What are three ways that you can help prevent violence?
2. What can you do to support someone who has experienced sexual violence?
3. Who are your local and/or campus resources?

2. What are colleges doing or not doing to educate their students on sexual assault?
